Support for Social Enterprise in East Africa is a two-year project financed by the European Union and implemented by the British Council. The project is designed to support underserved populations to access social protection, health, education and jobs and in doing so help foster inclusive and sustainable growth for human development. More specifically, the project strives to promote and strengthen an evidencebased social enterprise approach in addressing these development priorities in East Africa, notably in Ethiopia and Kenya.

Systemic, evidence-based, collaborative approaches underpin our work with policymakers and influencers. social enterprise intermediaries and practitioners. Through the implementation of the project, we create a range of capacity building opportunities for the different key beneficiary stakeholder institutions we work with. We support social entrepreneurs with access to training, mentoring and funding opportunities through capacity building programme activities implemented by partner civil society and business development support providing organizations. Programmes run by partner universities and Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) colleges promote the integration of social enterprise education in their curricula. We conduct social enterprise sector mapping. organize international study tours from East Africa to EU countries, and convene policy dialogues. In doing so, we support policymakers and influencers with evidence bases and platforms to share knowledge, best practices and tools to create conducive policy ecosystems for social entrepreneurship and investment development.

The East Africa Social Enterprise conference is a key element of the project, promoting collaboration and partnership between the social enterprise communities within and between Kenya and Ethiopia and the wider region and with Europe. The agenda is consequently informed by insights from the intervention in the past two years.

The social enterprise landscape in Ethiopia and Kenya reveals a young social enterprise scene, majority of

social enterprises are young and so are their leaders. Driven by this reality, deliberations focussing on investing in young people, to unlock the youth potential, are hoped to inspire commitment to champion this growing movement.

The questions about social enterprises objectives are important to help gauge the focus of social enterprises towards social good beyond creating employment opportunities. Social enterprises deliver products and services across diverse sectors: health, education, agriculture, etc. With due consideration, we have dedicated time to discuss how businesses with a social and environmental purpose can drive sustainable and inclusive development and help to address some of the biggest challenges targeted by the UN's Sustainable Development Goals.

We have seen that majority of social enterprises in Ethiopia and Kenya expect their venture to grow, mainly by expanding their services and attracting new customers or clients. However, these are not without challenges. Most frequently reported barrier to growth is the lack of capital in the form of debt or equity while obtaining grant funding is listed as the second biggest barrier to growth. Social Enterprises struggle in accessing finance which requires skills in selling their ideas, articulating their uniqueness from mainstream businesses. The breakout sessions present space for discourse on these and more.

Join the 300+ delegates to share and learn more about social enterprise, discuss on emerging issues, and debate future directions and necessary measures to scale up support for social enterprises in the region.

In 2010, she founded R&D Entrepreneurship and Outsourcing Centre plc, which is one of the first social enterprises in Ethiopia. The company serves international and local clients in (offshore) outsourcing and diverse business acceleration services. R&D has so far created job opportunities for over 200 youngsters and work with over 50 SMEs in Ethiopia.

Mrs. Boon-Dejene is the founder of Partners4Change, a platform for young professionals from all sector collaborate to seeking to improve sustainable development outcomes through smarter, more innovative, more effective public-private partnerships (PPPs).

Due to her remarkable works, Mrs. Boon-Dejene has been selected one of the 16 young sustainable leaders by Earth Charter International and Sustainable young professional of the Year by the Dutch sustainability movement and nominated by AWEP for WOE in 2011, 2013 and 2015 respectively.

Rahel holds an honor MBA degree from the University of Wolverhampton (UK), masters in Social Entrepreneurship from the University of Amsterdam and BA in International Business Management from Arnhem Business School.

Maisha

To leverage the potential of technological opportunities to address key development issues affecting millions of local population groups. Lead Technology Officer Fassika Fikre and social enterprise expert Tizzita Mengesha cofounded MAISHA, a company that launched mTena and is developing NISRE-Tena to promote access to much needed health information and services at huge scope and scale. mTena, an SMS-based mobile application, provides maternal and infant care information to pregnant women and new parents during gestation and nursing period. Nisre-Tena, a drone blood delivery system, aims to launch drones that deliver blood to people in remote, isolated and inaccessible rural areas in Ethiopia. Fassika overlooks the technical side of mTena, designed and is building the prototype Nisre-Tena fixed wing UAV.



Fiona Mwaura

Tinder

Fiona Mwaura set up Tinder, a company that develops products and business models that benefit the environment and produce affordable products for the low-income people of Kenya. Tinder's 'green' charcoal is produced from the Prosopis Juliflora tree which was declared a noxious weed by the Kenyan government, because it is distractive to the natural eco-system, reduces biodiversity through invading farm lands and it is also harmful to livestock. Working closely with the local community, Tinder selectively harvests P. Juliflora before converting it into high quality charcoal using efficient and modern equipment.

Tebita Ambulance

In his guest for private sector involvement and role to play in the development of the ambulance and pre-hospital emergency care business. Kibret Abebe proposed a convincing business concept to the Ministry of Health to craft enabling regulatory standards and license Tebita, the first and only private ambulance service enterprise in Ethiopia. Tebita provides high guality, affordable and equitable ambulance service to both rich and poor people, victims of deadliest car accidents as well as paramedic services to the Ethiopian national football teams pro bono. Tebita also offers training and supplies emergency equipment. Kibret uses a viable business model that invests the profit generated by the more lucrative businesses to crosssubsidize the less financially-viable ambulance wing. Kibret plans to establish a trauma centre in Ethiopia and launch an air ambulance in East Africa.

M-Shamba

Calvince Okello launched M-shamba, a social enterprise that provides digital extension services to smallholder farmers across East Africa through the use of interactive voice, SMS and Apps. This is accompanied by digital inclusion programmes.

Whiz Kids Workshop

Determined to promote the availability and accessibility of affordable and quality education opportunities for children in Ethiopia and realizing the outreach opportunities of broadcast and other mass media to educate children and youth at huge scale, Bruktawit Tigabu cofounded with her husband WhizKids Workshop, a company that produces a series of educational television programmes aired to deliver locally relevant and culturally acceptable content in local languages of Ethiopia. Bruktawit is in the process of translating materials into widely spoken international and local languages in Africa and launch these in different countries of the continent.

KOFAR

Francescah Munyi established KOFAR, a social enterprise that processes and sells fortified compost and soil conditioners. Francescah's products that reverse acidity, boost moisture retention and increase quality yields in Kenya.

Eshururu

Driven by his discovery of the uncertainties and vulnerabilities to serious risks and life-long negative impacts that children left in the hands of unskilled nannies are exposed to, Solomon Mulugeta set up Eshururu, a nanny training centre that develops thousands of professional caretakers. Solomon arranges financial aids from international organizations interested to rehabilitate young unemployed women groups to cover their training costs. Solomon plans to scale up this arrangement and create local jobs for returnee migrants. Also in the horizon is a massive expansion plan to launch multiple branches in Addis Ababa and across the country.

Beautiful Minds Ethiopia

Tons of leftover soaps from over 500 hotels in Addis Ababa alone end up in landfill every day, aggravating environmental sanitation issues that pose health challenges. On the other hand, millions of poor people who cannot afford soap live in poor hygiene, exposed to communicable diseases such as diarrhoea and blindness due to trachoma. To combat the water. sanitation and hygiene (WASH) related issues that pose such health challenges: Avatam Simeneh started Beautiful Minds Ethiopia, a recycling company that promotes access to affordable soap to prevent communicable diseases caused by poor hygiene while improving environmental sanitation by collecting leftover soap from hotel rooms and turning it into value. Beautiful Minds distributes the recycled soap through schools to reach children. Ayatam plans to expand the project and operate in several regional states across Ethiopia.
